I hope each and every one of you is having a blessed day!

As you know we have a lovely campus to be proud of and Plant Operations works diligently to keep it clean, fresh, and operating smoothly.

Currently we are working hard to save energy which will ultimately be beneficial to you as well as Mother Nature by installing light-emitting diode (LED) bulbs that use a fraction of the electricity that the current bulbs use. You will see us changing them in common areas of the building as often as the budget permits.

Because LEDs have many advantages over incandescent light sources including lower energy consumption, longer lifetime, more resilient smaller size, and faster switching, you might consider changing the lighting in your apartment. Your small investment to convert to LED along with our efforts campus-wide would have a significant impact on our expenses.

LED's can be found at your local home improvement store and as time permits Plant Operations will be glad to assist you with this cost-saving project.

Other areas we are trying to monitor are the heating and air conditioning systems. The U.S. Department of Energy suggests that all thermostats be set at  $78^{\circ}$  cooling and  $72^{\circ}$  heating. One degree of cooling or heating can save hundreds of dollars. Your power bill is around \$30,000 a month. Is that a shocker or what?

Would you please consider adjusting your thermostat just one degree in your apartment? The financial impact would be significant.

# Whitman Writes for Windows


**Bill Whitman**, a co-author of a text book in it's 7th edition, has joined the *Windows* Newsletter Committee.
