Fighting ended on the Western Front of the First World War on November 11, 1918. Celebrations on the end of the war soon turned solemn in remembrance of all who were lost. Armistice Day was officially recognized by U.S. President Woodrow Wilson in 1919, and it began to be observed throughout the world, honoring those who brought about the end of the "Great War." In 1954, after the return of service personnel from World War II and the Korean War, U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill declaring November 11th as Veterans Day, encouraging Americans to commit themselves to the cause of peace and to honor America's Veterans for their courage, honor, patriotism, and sacrifice.

The Towers has a fairly large contingent of Veterans in residence. Stop by the Wall of Honor, and you will see photos of your neighbors who have served. Shooter Alert Review

Sargeant William Andrews of the Rock Hill Police Department presented a seminar titled CRASE - Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events. He instructed Towers' residents on how to become more aware of surroundings so as not to become victims should an incident occur.

Statistics show that most perpetrators have an "avenger" mindset and seek attention to get their message across. Incidents, such as Columbine, revealed that SWAT teams need to move in more quickly. Today, if two policemen show up, they are to enter immediately.

There are three possible ways to respond in a situation:

- 1. DENIAL "What was that?" "It couldn't be." "I must have imagined it."
- 2. DELIBERATION taking too long to determine if there is a problem before acting, or wondering what to do
- 3. DECISIVE MOMENT training oneself for deliberate, reflexive actions like FIGHT, FLIGHT, FREEZE

Upon entering a new setting, always look for a second exit in case "flight" might be a possibility. Don't waste time deliberating with others. One person can make a difference by insisting that people move out, as Rick Scorla did in the Twin Towers, thus saving the lives of 2700.

Changes occur in an individual when the heart experiences a high stress level. At 90 beats per minute, fine motor skills are lost. At 120, gross motor skills are lost. At 150, tunnel vision occurs. When an incident is in progress, seek to keep calm. Bring heart rate down by breathing in for the count of three, holding breath for count of three, and releasing breath for count of three.

When the police come, get down and show hands. There may be yelling. The priorities of the police will be to stop the killing, stop the dying, and evacuate the area as quickly as possible. Know that the EMS will be delayed outside by police until it is safe to come in.

Taking immediate responder training is a wise endeavor by learning to use pressure on wounds, pack them with gauze, and apply tourniquets to quell bleeding which, if not controlled, can cause death in three minutes. Know where FIRST AID KITS are located. (One is at the entrance desk.)

The best scenario is to avoid the scene by getting away, or denying access to your space, and then defending yourself by any means you have if entrance is gained by an intruder.

The Importance of Voting

The United States of America is a republic, though it is often called a democracy. What is the difference? In a democracy, each member votes on all matters, and a simple majority wins. That means minority rights can be overridden by only 51 votes. A real abuse of power can happen. Participants vote according to what is right in their own eyes with no overarching guidelines to follow.

In a republic, however, citizens elect representatives who legislate on their behalf. These elected officials must swear to uphold the Constitution and the Bill of Rights, since they are the founding documents and moral guide of the nation, and our rights are protected by them. Ideally, representatives reflect the wishes of the ones who vote them into office, which is why it is important to research the backgrounds and positions of candidates. It is also wise to discover who is funding them, which might reveal more about what they truly believe and how they will vote than what they say in their campaign speeches.

Voting is a great privilege, though there are many who do not vote for a variety of reasons. But it is more than a privilege – it is a duty, and every vote is important. Stories are told of the difference just one or a handful of votes have made in the outcomes of elections, especially at the local level. The Westminster Towers bus will take anyone who wants to vote to our local polling venue. There is even curbside assistance for those not able to go in. Since we have the time to do our research and have several ways to vote, let's do it! Let's keep our bus driver very busy on election day – but not so busy he doesn't have time to vote himself!

In gratitude to God, William Bradford, proclaimed a grand feast of thanksgiving in 1623 to celebrate His goodness and invited the Indians.


Duchess will return this year on Saturday, December 14th and give a concert in Heritage Hall at our annual Christmas Coffee.
