

As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. "Don't be alarmed," he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. But go tell his disciples and Peter. He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him just as he told you."

Jesus is alive! He is in heaven today, seated at the right hand of the Father. When we accept Him as Lord and Savior, we also have the assurance of being resurrected one day and living with him for all eternity. Until then, His Spirit lives within us. When we celebrate Easter, we are reminded of those timeless truths. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

Meet Your Neighbors



I moved into Westminster Towers in November '24 after realizing that I was facing new health concerns, kidney failure. I have a daughter who lives in Cincinnati and a son in Pleasantville, NY. They helped force me into the decision, one that I had considered for several years. I loved my house in Rock Hill where I had lived for over 40 years. I dreaded the thought of getting rid of all my "stuff," treasures my wife and I found in antique stores during our 43 years of marriage. We loved to buy bargains in the rough and restore them together. Carolyn died in 2005 of cancer.

I married again to Margaret, and we lived mostly in my Blowing Rock Mountain house because she had resided in Boone for much of her life. This too, was a good marriage, but she died in 2020.

I am a Rock Hill native, attended Winthrop Training School, Rock Hill High, and Clemson. Carolyn was from the Cincinnati area, and used to say that I came there to find her because I was kin to everyone in York County. My mother, Earle Neely Townsend, was one of the early residents of Westminster and lived here for ten years.

I finished Clemson with a Mechanical Engineering degree and took my first job with Allis Chalmers in Cincinnati where I met and married Carolyn. After 2 ½ years in the Army, we settled in Charlotte where I worked for Kendall Co. I later worked in the construction industry for several years, until I bought and managed Waldrop Supply in Rock Hill selling plumbing supplies and appliances. Many locals remember us because of Carolyn's shop within the store, the Kitchen Corner, where she sold kitchen gadgets and decorations. I sold the business in 2000 and retired.

Retired does not mean I quit work. I have two serious hobbies, woodworking and old cars. My primary woodworking shop is at the Blowing Rock house, and my old cars are in my building where I ran Waldrop Supply. I told friends that when in Rock Hill, I was an auto mechanic, and when in Blowing Rock, a furniture maker. And that has been true for the last 25 years.

I prefer to build period furniture of walnut and cherry, but have bent to make a few modern pieces for grandchildren's special orders. I filled all corners of my two houses plus a few in my family's homes. I refrained from making pieces for sale. I made a number of small items that I donated to the gift shop in the White Home. When I moved to Westminster, I brought my first major piece, a corner cupboard and my last, a wine cellarette.

I worked in my grandfather's auto garage as a youth and always loved the American autos. During high school, my brother and I would buy junkers from the used car lot, fix them, and

sell them for profit. In my 20's, I bought my first antique car, a '32 Lincoln. It came from a junk yard and was in terrible condition, but all I could afford. It took 13 years for me to put it on the road, but it was a beauty! My interest gravitated to the model A Ford, a simple car built between 1928 and 1931. I have four. Earlier, Ford made the famous tin lizzie, the Model T, and I have two of those. I belong to the area club, Queen City Model A Club, and have opened my shop to members where we work on each other's cars. We have performed complete restorations but focus on maintenance needed to keep them on the road.

I guess you could say I have gone full circle. My shop? It is my grandfather's auto dealership building in downtown Rock Hill where I worked as a youth. I bought the building in the 80's, rent the front to a friend, and use the shop as my playroom. I work there three days a week.

I am happy with my decision to move into the Towers. People are friendly, I eat better, and I am free to work without the overhead of maintenance needs at my house. I have the comfort of knowing that if I have health needs, Westminster is prepared to assist me.

Ukraine and Russia by Milt Jellum

We had a unique opportunity in 2008 to take a Dnieper River cruise in Ukraine with Gate 1 Travel followed by a Volga River cruise in Russia and Grand Circle Travel (GCT). Our plan was to make one round trip air flight for two cruise tours. Everything looked in order after booking the different river cruises with two travel companies and round-trip air flight with GCT. However, after several weeks, we were notified by GCT that they did not have a contract with Aerovit Airlines for us to fly early before our cruise with Gate 1 Travel. Therefore, we had to cruise with Gate 1 or add round trip flights to our tour. Since we did not want to cancel, we flew from Kiev to JFK where we found a motel overnight, and the next day we flew from JFK back to Kiev. In summary: we few about 10,000 miles and 20 hours of flight time in two days (this was not our original plans.)

UKRAINE: Dnieper River cruise with Gate 1 Travel. Before the cruise, we had three days for sightseeing in the port city, Odessa. What was most interesting about Odessa are the tunnels dug out of limestone for building houses above ground. It is estimated that there are over 1,200 miles of tunnels under Odessa.

The Odesa catacombs are a labyrinth-like network of tunnels located under the city of Odesa and its outskirts in Ukraine, that are mostly the result of mining limestone.

The cruise began by going into the Black Sea to Yalta where we toured the Livadia Palace site of the Yalta Conference. The Livadia Palace was the summer home of the last Czar Nicolas II, the last of the Romanovs.





After Yalta, we had a tour of Sevastopol which has one of the world's largest panoramas. In the battle of Sevastopol, the Russians had a cannon named "Dora" (and we have a small Dora in the Towers.) The Cannon Dora was 1,488 tons and it took 60 railroad cars to transport it, and when set up, it was 164 feet high with a 107-foot barrel. It took more than 4,000 men to transport, guard, maintain, and fire it with 5- and 7-ton shells that went up to 29 miles distance. The Dnieper River cruise ended in Kiev where we visited St. Sophia's Cathedral and the extensive underground catacombs.

RUSSIA: Volga River cruise with GCT. Before the cruise we had time in Moscow to visit the Kremlin, Red Square, GUM department store and other sites. We had previously spent time in Moscow in 1992 and 1999 and we saw vast improvements from 1992 and 2008.




A port call was made at Ulyanov, Lenin's boyhood home. All the houses and neighborhood where Lenin grew up are preserved as they were in the early 1900's.

The next port of Saratov was the hometown of Yuri Gagarin, the first human to travel into space. He died in 1968 in a Mig Plane on a routine training flight.





The last port of call on the Volga River was Stalingrad. Stalingrad was totally destroyed during World War II where the German army had about 500,000 personnel at the beginning siege of Stalingrad and only about 5,000 ever saw Germany again. Many monuments and museums are found throughout the city. One statue known as "Mother Russia" is 170 feet high and weighs 8,000 tons (the sword alone weighs 14 tons.) It is the largest statue in the world followed by the Statue of Liberty and by the Christ Statue in Rio.

We have 12 Goldfish.

They are mostly gold (orange) but we have a few multi-color patterns.

When you walk through the lobby take a look out the window into the courtyard and try to spot our new residents. Chick Williams has transformed our fountain into a Goldfish Pond.

Goldfish are a relatively small member of the carp family and were domesticated from wild carp by the Chinese over 1,000 years ago. Over time and with selected breeding, many different breeds of goldfish have been developed. Today you can find goldfish in a variety of shapes, colors, and sizes.

Goldfish can grow their whole life and live up to 25 years in captivity. Common goldfish can easily

reach 10-12 inches in length and can be trained to recognize their owners and music. And goldfish in an outdoor pond will live longer than fish in an aquarium.

Goldfish are cold-water fish and thrive in water between 68° and 76°F but can survive in temperatures a few degrees above freezing. If the temperature dips below 60°F for more than a few days, they will go into hibernation and can survive for a few months.

The recycling center in the basement accepts plastic grocery bags and dry-cleaning bags for recycling. Bags must be <u>completely empty and clean</u>. These bags can be transformed into new products rather than polluting God's beautiful world.
