

Placid poise and genuine artful living.



A Brief History of Memorial Day

Memorial Day (originally known as Decoration Day) is one of the federal holidays in the United States for honoring and mourning the U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. It is observed on the last Monday of May.

The first national observance of Memorial Day occurred on May 30, 1868 (then Decoration Day), and was proclaimed by

Commander in Chief John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic, to honor the Union soldiers who had dies in the American Civil War. The National Cemetery Administration, a division of the Department of Veterans Affairs, credits Mary Ann Williams with originating the "idea of strewing the graves of Civil War soldiers—Union and Confederate" with flowers.

The world wars turned it into a day of remembrance for all members of the U.S. military who fought and died in service. In 1971, Congress standardized the holiday as "Memorial Day" and changed its observance to the last Monday in May.
